




EMANUELE VISCUSO IS A GENuine Renaissance man. Dashing and ebullient, the Sicilian-born Viscuso has lived in Miami just a year and a half, and his lyrical sculptures of wood and fiberglass have already attracted the attention of this country's cultural cognoscenti.

His works, which "are modular and based on mathematics," Viscuso says, are also derived from a lifetime of experience. He was trained as a lawyer, worked as a banker for 11 years, and then one day in 1984 decided to follow his heart and return to the art world. "When I left the bank to make art, I supposed my

art would be music," he says. (Viscuso is a concert pianist and composer.) "But less than a year after leaving the bank, I had an exhibition of artworks called "Drawings of Music," and I sold everything." The drawings turned into sculptures, first executed with large packing staples, then wooden maquettes, and finally creations that grace large public spaces and intimate gardens.

While his work has a modern feel, Viscuso is adamant about its classical inspiration. "My father was a sculptor—in the classic way—bodies, horses. My mother was a teacher, a headmistress,

and she played the piano. My sculptures mix the two things—the music and the classic sculpture. There is always a vibration, a rhythm to them. There is harmony."

As successful as Viscuso has become in the short time he's been here-he was already well established in Italy, with one of his sculptures installed in the Milan airport-he has not rested on his art laurels. He keeps a piano in his studio, which he returns to during interruptions in the art-making process. He has created a line of trompe l'oeil wallpapers with a well-known firm in Italy, and he has a yet-to-be-unveiled proposal for the site of the World Trade Center-a remarkable tribute to life. He is also putting Italian and American mayors in touch-starting with Miami and Palermo-to create some way to connect the two cities with art. "Art can be magic," Viscuso says. "It can be an imaginary bridge that connects us all."

Hence the title of his airport sculpture in Milan, Wave-Bridge on the Imaginary.

It was a night of surprises Sunday during the 51st birthday celebration of Italian sculptor Emanuele Viscuso. 

To be able to go further than the beyond, with the help of art, is a choice of life, a belief, affirms Emanuele Viscuso, a sculptor from Palermo who has lived for many years in Milan, in the heart of Brera, the artists' quarter. To try to reach the universe is the only hope permitted to man, by creating art, or living art, one overcomes the materialism of life which is already in itself a work of art. This is created day after day, hour after hour, minute after minute, by reliving the past, living in the present and imagining the future.

Emanuele Viscuso uses mainly wood for his works, the material in essence is poor but the outer form reflects the inner richness of the artist and his need for harmony in which truth, goodness and beauty converge.

Frank Lloyd Wright said "Simplicity and dignity are the qualities which measure the true value of each work of art; and these, are the peculiarities of his sculptures which are both essential and so precious that they attract the curiosity of the spectator and capture his attention".

The result of aesthetic research which stems from his spirituality, as he aspires to expand without limits, to a fourth dimension.

Freedom and law, romanticism and rationalism form the womb of his structures projected upwards, that extend towards the unknown always leaving presumed new evolutions.


He is also a good poet and composer of music and his sculptures are saturated with vibrations even though they are meticulously attentive and calculated.

but miraculously generous and the spectator can himself avert the pureness and faith his work contains.

Therefore there is no relationship between his proposals and the construction, of optical art and poor art; his are different messages of an instinctive and informal artist who works with control and rationalism.




